[Course Outline]

This course will explore Japanese culture through Japanese picture books.

Books help us learn about different countries and their cultures. Japanese picture books can also be a great door to Japanese culture. They, either explicitly or implicitly, deal with something common among Japanese people. Many of them have been translated into English. In this course, exchange students will be able to learn some foundational aspects of Japanese culture through picture books with English translations. On the other hand, NUFS students will reexamine their own culture, which will be the first step to understanding other cultures.

Although it is not compulsory, this course will also offer opportunities to both exchange and NUFS students to interact with local Japanese kids through reading aloud picture books in English as one of the regional collaboration programs of NUFS.

授業概要、学習目標 (Course Description)

[Course Goals]

This course aims to deepen students' understanding of Japanese culture.

Course goals are as follows:

- 1. All students will gain knowledge of picture books in general.
- 2. Exchange students will become familiar with some of the classic Japanese picture books (in English-translated versions).
- 3. Exchange students will become able to identify the cultural differences between Japan and their own countries in the provided picture books.
- 4. NUFS students will become more mindful of their own culture which they usually not be aware of.
- 5. NUFS students will improve their English abilities by working together with exchange students.

This course will consist of lectures, discussions, and presentations.

The lecturer will introduce the topics in the classes, using some Japanese picture books, and let the students deepen their understanding of the topic through classroom small-group discussions. All students will be highly expected to contribute to the discussions actively.

The students will be asked to give group presentations in the class as well. NUFS students and exchange students will work together for the presentations, selecting a Japanese picture book from the NUFS library or some local public libraries and examining some cultural differences found in the book.

	As for the final report, each student will choose one of the books mentioned in the class, and
	compile a report on the book from the viewpoint of Japanese culture.
	Classes will be taught mainly in English and all classroom discussions will be in English. All students, however, are encouraged to pick up and try some Japanese picture books in the original. Japanese students can submit their final reports either in English or Japanese.
	Students are expected to spend 180 minutes for preparation and reviewing for each class.

授業概要、学習目標 (Course Description)	The goal of the course is to familiarize students with basic concepts, issues and challenges in the realm of public interest (community) interpreting and translation in Japan. Before turning its attention to Japanese-English interpreting and translation in the legal setting, the course will first provide an introduction to Interpreting and Translation Studies at large and an overview of relevant literature on public interest interpreting and translation, forensic linguistics as well as related paradigms in English studies (especially those focusing on the global nature and role of the English language). Some basic exercises related to interpreting and translation (e.g. shadowing or revising texts using 'Plain English') may be introduced, however no Japanese proficiency is required to enroll in the course. Students will be expected to read portions of relevant literature, conduct individual and/or group research and present their findings in class, participate actively in group discussions and submit a final term paper or to give a final presentation (depending on the number of enrolled students) to successfully complete the course. (2) In this global age we are forced to decide on how we see the world and our role in it.
